Thinking of these things will surely bring us to our knees in adoration, but true worship means putting him at the centre of our lives. I wonder if we can cope with this.

The Christmas story tells of God becoming a vulnerable human whose bed was a manger, but his vulnerability lasted much longer than infancy and childhood. In maturity Jesus made himself vulnerable by touching lepers, associating with those who were despised by others, challenging the religious elite and going to the cross. Following him, with him at the centre of our lives, we must allow ourselves to become vulnerable too: to allow him to touch our lives, and to reach out in love to others in places and situations where we're well out of our comfort zone.

As we remember his birth it's easy to forget that this baby is

the one who now challenges to go beyond our natural human responses by loving our enemies, turning the other cheek and forgiving unconditionally.



#### **Christmas Tree legends**

It seems to be generally recognised that the people who lived in what is now called Germany were the first to develop the tradition of the Christmas tree.

Many legends exist about its origins. One is the story of Saint Boniface, an English monk who organised the Christian Church in France and Germany.

One day travelling through Germany, he came upon a group of pagans gathered around a great oak tree about to sacrifice a child to their god. In anger and to stop the sacrifice and save the child's life, Boniface felled the tree with one mighty blow of his fist. In its place grew a small fir tree. The Saint told the pagan worshippers that the tiny fir tree was the Tree of Life and stood for the eternal life of Christ.

The Christmas Tree Across the World Early Christmas trees, harking back to pre Christian times, had figures of fairies - the good spirits - while horns and bells were placed on it to frighten off evil spirits. In Poland Christmas trees were always decorated with angels, peacocks and other birds as well as many stars. In Sweden, trees are decorated with brightly painted wooden

ornaments and straw figures of animals and children. In Denmark, tiny Danish flags, along with mobiles of bells, stars, snowflakes and hearts are hung on Christmas trees. Japanese

Christians prefer tiny fans and paper lanterns. Lithuanians cover their trees with straw bird cages, stars and geometric shapes. The straw sends a wish for good crops in the coming year. In the Czech Republic trees display ornaments made from painted egg shells. In the Ukraine every Christmas tree has a spider and web for good luck. Legend has it that a poor woman with nothing to put on her children's tree woke on Christmas morning to find the branches covered with spider webs turned to silver by the rising sun. In Britain, the custom of a decorated Christmas tree appears to have started in the early nineteenth century, when Albert, the Prince Consort to Queen Victoria brought the tradition from his homeland of Saxe-Coburg, now part of Germany. The example set by royalty became a general fashion.

Giving Thanks - the story is told of the grandmother who every Christmas sent her grandchildren a large cheque but she never received so much of a thank you, despite the urging of their respective parents. But one year things changed and the next day all the grandchilden came over to thank her. She was telling this to a friend who said, "How wonderful! What do you think caused them to become so polite?" "Oh", said the grandmother, "it was easy. This year I didn't sign the cheques!"

# A Christmas reunion - a true story from Brooklyn USA

The brand new pastor and his wife, newly assigned to their first ministry to reopen a church in suburban Brooklyn, arrived in early October excited about their opportunities. When they saw their church, it was very run down and needed much work. They set a goal to have everything done in time to have their first service on Christmas Eve.

They worked hard, repairing pews, plastering walls, painting, etc., and on December 18th they were ahead of schedule and just about finished. On December 19th a terrible tempest - a driving rainstorm - hit the area and lasted for two days. On the 21st, the pastor went over to the church. His heart sank when he saw that the roof had leaked, causing a large area of plaster about 20 feet by 8 feet to fall off the front wall of the sanctuary just behind the pulpit, beginning about head high.

The pastor cleaned up the mess on the floor, and not knowing what else to do but postpone the Christmas Eve service, headed home. On the way he noticed that a local business was having a flea market type sale for charity so he stepped in. One of the items was a beautiful, handmade, ivory coloured, crocheted tablecloth with exquisite work, fine colours and a Cross embroidered right in the centre. It was just the right size to cover up the hole in the front wall. He bought it and headed back to the church.

By this time it had started to snow. An older woman running from the opposite direction was trying to catch the bus. She missed it. The pastor invited her to wait in the warm church for the next bus 45 minutes later. She sat in a pew and paid no attention to the pastor while he got a ladder, hangers, etc., to put up the tablecloth as a wall tapestry. The pastor could hardly believe how beautiful it looked and it covered up the entire problem area.

Then he noticed the woman walking down the centre aisle. Her face was like a sheet. "Pastor," she asked, "where did you get that tablecloth?"

The pastor explained. The woman asked him to check the lower right corner to see if the initials, EBG were crocheted into it there. They were. These were the initials of the woman, and she had made this tablecloth 35 years before, in Austria.

The woman could hardly believe it as the pastor told how he had just got the Tablecloth. The woman explained that before the war she and her husband were well-to-do people in Austria. When the Nazis came, she was forced to leave. Her husband was going to follow her the next week. She was captured, sent to prison and never saw her husband or her home again. The pastor wanted to give her the tablecloth; but she made the pastor keep it for the church. The pastor insisted on driving her home, which was the least he could do. She lived on the other side of Staten Island and was only in Brooklyn for the day for a housecleaning job.

What a wonderful service they had on Christmas Eve. The church was almost full. The music and the spirit were great. At the end of the service, the pastor and his wife greeted everyone at the door and many said that they would return.

One older man, whom the pastor recognized from the neighbourhood, continued to sit in one of the pews and stare, and the pastor wondered why he wasn't leaving. The man asked him where he got the tablecloth on the front wall because it was identical to one that his wife had made years ago when they lived in Austria before the war and how could there be two tablecloths so much alike? He told the pastor how the Nazis came, how he forced his wife to flee for her safety, and he was supposed to follow her, but he was arrested and put in a prison. He never saw his wife or his home again all the 35 years in between.

The pastor asked him if he would allow him to take him for a little ride. They drove to Staten Island and to the same house where the pastor had taken the woman three days earlier. He helped the man climb the three flights of stairs to the woman's apartment, knocked on the door and he saw the greatest Christmas reunion he could ever imagine.

# **Saint Stephen**

An excellent and well trusted orator, his preaching style was so effective that many Jews became worried about his success. They accused him of blasphemy and he was made to stand trial.

# Trial and death by stoning

At the supreme Jewish law court, the Sanhedrin, Stephen recounted the many mercies that God had given the children of Israel, and the ungrateful way in which they had repaid Him. He accused them of murdering Jesus, whose coming, he said, had been foretold by Moses. This angered the crowd and he was dragged out onto the streets. He was then stoned to death according to the law at that time, an event witnessed by St Paul. It is believed he died around the year 34AD. He is believed to have been initially buried in a grave to the north of Jerusalem, but this body was exhumed and moved to a new grave outside the Damascus Gate. This is where the stoning is believed to have taken place.

Stephen is the patron saint of deacons, headaches, horses, coffin makers, and masons. He is often represented carrying a pile of rocks or with rocks on his head. St Stephen's Day is 26th December and it is name checked in the Christmas carol Good King Wenceslas.

"I want to buy a donkey and I must have one tonight. I'm going on a journey with a baby and my wife.


A good sure-footed donkey could just save the infant's life."
